A Lenten Message from Pastor Todd

40 Days

Following his baptism, Jesus was driven by the Spirit immediately into the wilderness. "He was in the



wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him." – Mark 1:12-13

Three hundred years later, early Church leaders instituted a forty-day period (less Sundays) before Good Friday when the faithful prepare themselves for the death and resurrection of Jesus. Lent (from the Latin *Quadragesima*, meaning fortieth) is the intersection, the common

ground, we share with the struggle and temptation of Jesus. Lent is an opportunity to abide in Jesus and to invite Jesus to abide in you, too.

Temptation and sin were real for Jesus, and they are real for each of us today.

I invite you to join me in the observation of a holy Lent, starting with Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021, ending with Good Friday, April 2, 2021. Ash Wednesday will begin with the burning of last year's palm branches at 6:30 pm outside the kitchen door of the church. All are invited to the traditional service with imposition of ashes at 7:00

pm with the words "remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Preparation for the death and resurrection of Jesus includes prayer and penance. Consider a daily prayer of confession; sins known and unknown, intentional or unintentional, large or small. Time your confession to God by the length of your daily shower, morning commute, or walk to the mailbox and back.

Confession of sin leads the faithful to contemplate how to stop the sin. Ask yourself "what can I do right now to put to death my sin?" Be specific. Write it down. Reflect on Jesus confronting Satan in the wilderness, the danger he faced by the wild beasts, and the angels who waited upon him. Listen for God to answer. With the same resolve of Jesus rebuking Satan, end your sin immediately. Begin life in a new direction, one that leads you closer to Christ, leaving darkness behind.

Giving alms to those in need and self-denial are

complimentary Lenten traditions. Don't throw up your hands overwhelmed by life and say "There is nothing I can do!" There is something everyone can do to confront the needs of the world. It begins with a gift of time, talent, or money to someone in need. Make your gift such that it becomes sacrificial. Deny yourself enough to make you wince.

Giving up chocolate for Lent? Take the money not spent on chocolate for 40 days, multiply it by 10 or 20, and contribute to one of our church's many missions. Your gift should hurt. If you want some ideas, speak with Erma Perkins, our Lay Leader for Missions. What can you do without this Lent that results in sacrificial almsgiving?

Lent concludes on Good Friday, with the death of Jesus. "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Our 7:00 pm April 2, 2021 Good Friday service will conclude with darkness, only punctuated with the light of the Christ candle. The light of Christ affirms our

faith in resurrection, only one night, a day, and a morning away. Though the body may die, eternal life through the resurrection of Jesus Christ is our destiny.

May we be joined in a holy and meaningful Lent this year.



The late, great Mr. Rogers advised that in troubled time we should "look for the helpers"! Simple... but true.

Thank you for continuing to be among the helpers providing food for the R-H Community. The need is great and your support is much appreciated.

By my "unofficial" records in our last fiscal year RHAFT volunteers provided food on 334 occasions to 213 families facing an emergency shortage of food.



On a cumulative basis, 352 children and 574 adults were helped by the emergency food deliveries. Most families received help one or two times during the year; other families in difficult situations received help 3 to 6 times.

We also provided a holiday gift to 347 seniors, supplied food through the Henrietta Senior Center for an additional 137 seniors and provided for 93 children through a summer backpack program.



Confirmation Class Starting In March

Purpose: to educate youth with sufficient information to make an informed decision about confirming their baptism and joining the membership of the church.

Core Principles: Confirmation is a continuation of one's faith journey which began at baptism. It is an opportunity for students to become fully engaged in the life of the church through worship, service, and ministries. Students should emerge from confirmation prepared for a life of Christian discipleship.

Students: opened to all baptized individuals, committed to attending and participating in eighteen sessions, willing to work weekly with their mentor to complete their Confirmation Journal, and attend and participate in worship and scheduled events.

Open to Junior / Senior High school students, Adults, and people with developmental disabilities.

Mentors: Students select their own mentor. A mentor must be an active member of the local church, be willing to work with the student to complete their Confirmation Journal, and attend and participate in meetings and field trips.

Parents: welcome to attend and participate at every meeting and field trips, supply meals when needed, and assist with transportation.

Leader: Pastor Todd

Curriculum: Credo Confirmation, the official resource for The United Methodist Church, approved by the General Board of Discipleship, and published by Cokesbury. Students and mentors only need to order the journal. To order your Credo Confirmation Journal call 800.672.1789. Though out of print, it may also be found on Amazon (Used: about \$9, New: about \$22).

Mission and Outreach

After Jesus' baptism he announced, "Here comes God's kingdom! Change your hearts and lives." Mark 1:15



The pandemic has imposed drastic changes on the way we live our lives. How do we need to change our hearts?

During the downtime, I have been attempting to clear out some of the 75 years of accumulated stuff. I question the value of purchasing items that clutter my life. Why the avidity for buying? If you have moved or been involved in clearing out someone's home, you know how burdensome it can be.



How can we change our hearts to avoid conspicuous consumption? Rabbi Waskow wrote, "Those who are spiritually famished are almost certain to gobble up material goods; the spiritually well-fed can more easily choose to limit their material intake." A regular practice of scripture reading, prayer, meditation, personnel and community worship, acts of mercy, compassion and faithful living will keep our spirits healthy.

Increased awareness of those who struggle with the basic needs of existence is another way to change our hearts. One of those areas

of need is Musa weNkosi in South Africa. Over 40 orphans are cared for. The staff also provides food for needy neighbors.

They provided food to a "Gogo", grandmother

caring for a 3 month old and 6 year old after her daughter died. She burst into tears and said she thought God had forgotten her.

When the leaders of the early church were debating whether Jewish customs needed to be practiced by the new Christians, "they asked only that we would remember the poor."
Galatians 2:10.

If you are involved in a mission or aware of a need we might be able to address, please let me know.

"Let's not get tired of doing good because in time we'll have a harvest if we don't give up. So then let's work for the good of all whenever we have an opportunity, and especially for

those in the household of faith." Galatians 6:9, 10


